Expository Bible Study

The expository method of Bible study seeks to present:

- a) Truths
- b) concepts
- c) principles that are taught by a Scripture passage.
- It does not impose a meaning on a passage, but seeks a meaning from the passage.
- The basis of true expository Bible study is a thorough "exegesis" of the passage.
- Exegesis seeks to investigate the literal meaning of each word of Scripture.
- The definition of each word is considered with its relationship to the other words in its context. ("context," refers to the verses before and after a verse and involves the environment, situation, and background in which you find a word or verse)

THE OBJECTIVES OF EXPOSITORY BIBLE STUDY

The objectives are:

1. To teach how to study and correctly interpret the Scriptures.

- 2. To teach how to develop a lesson, devotional or sermon.
- 3. To become familiar with Bible study helps such as dictionaries, handbooks, and concordances.
- 4. To build confidence in one's ability to understand the Bible and to teach others.

The procedures of the method are:

- 1. The primary activity will be personal study
- 2. Study passages of Scripture in detail to decide what they are saying.
- 3. Practical hands on use of Bible and Bible study helps will help build confidence.
- 4. Start a good Bible reference library.
